

## Mini-School Overview

Mini-School is an alternative program located within Minnetonka High School where tenth, eleventh, and twelfth graders are working together with a group of teachers to change their attitudes and perspectives. The students cometto Mini-School with a history of not succeeding very well in traditional school. Many of them are dangerously close to dropping out of school. Some have dropped out and are returning to give school one more try. They are tired of failing, tired of breaking rules, tired of being identified as negative people in the mainstream school culture.

At Mini-School they begin to put their lives together—in school and out of school. They become part of a school family where they can be themselves without fear of recrimination. In Mini-School they set goals, share responsibilities, solve problems, learn academic and basic living skills, and have fun.

This supportive family atmosphere encourages students to develop responsibility, accountability, and positive self-esteem. Students are encouraged to view themselves as learners in the holistic sense of the term—intellectual, emotional, physical, and spiritual.

Mini-School began in the 1970-71 school year and is still meeting the needs of many students. Mini-School now serves not only the Minnetonka School district but neighboring districts as well, due to its affiliation with the larger Area Learning Center.

And on each end of the rifle we're the same.


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

#### Costly time of year By: Jamle Rasmussen







It's the holiday season again, and let's hope that everyone's prepared, because it's coming if you're ready or not. There are so many things to do this time of year, that most people don't stop to remember what they're celebrating in the first place and why. Sadly enough, the distant echo of times past can hardly be heard over the ringing of department store registers. Don't get me wrong, I'm not referring to everyone!! Only basing my opinion on the fact that sales soar around this time and most everyone goes broke buying gifts. Coincidence? Probably not. But I'm here not to criticize, but to remind you of what this time of year is really about.

Originally, before the take over of the Romans, people of the Old Ways would celebrate Solstice. There are two Solstices actually; the Summer and the Winter. Everyone knows about them, I would hope. Summer Solstice being the longest day of the year, June 21. And Winter Solstice being the longest night of the year, December 21.

Traditionally, the Solstice was referred to as "Yule"--A word that comes from Germanic languages--and was a time for many things, but primarily for retaining hope in the middle of the cold winter months. You see, after the Harvest, which was usually on September 23rd, Autumn Equinox--Equal day and equal night--the people of the Old Ways would prepare for the coming winter months. The Solstice was the day that marked the peak of the cold and the lengthening of the days back toward spring. And when spring did come around, it was a time for fertilizing the land and planting seeds for food to grow, and then be harvested for the next winter to come. The Solstices and Equinoxes are key days in the cycle of the Earth.

But because it's Yule time, we've decided to give you a few fun facts of traditional things that took place and why. So maybe you can feel closer to the predecessors of this Earth by giving some of these traditions a shot. You may be surprised though, most of these Old Way traditions are strikingly similar to the traditions of today.....

#### Fun Facts:

---A tree of evergreen is brought into the house and decorated to symbolize the continuation of life, and to renew the hope that warm months are soon to come.

- ---Holly and mistletoe is brought into the home and used to decorate the house for the same reason the evergreen tree was, to renew hope that the Earth will soon wake from it's slumber and bloom again.
- --- Exchanging gifts is a symbol of remembering the things given to you throughout the year, and of giving to people less fortunate something to hope for in the coming months.
- ---Hanging mistletoe and being kissed under it is an old Druid custom.
- --- A time to lean on each other and think about the support, kindness, and friendship of others.
- --- A time of rejoicing and being merry about the things you have, and sharing those things with friends and family.

Note: Many people still celebrate these days religiously. In several different cultures there were many Gods and Goddesses attached to these sacred days of the cycle of the Earth, and large amounts of people still celebrate them today.

- -25-60g (1-2oz) sugar per egg white, depending how sweet you like it

#### Method:

- 1 -place the sponge cake on an ovenproof dish and soak it with a little fruit syrup.
- 2- Now whisk the egg whites until really stiff and dry and fold in the sugar carefully.
- **3**-Take the icecream out of the freezer and place it on top of the sponge cake. Top the icecream with the fruit.
- **4**-Now spread the margarine mix over the top, being very careful to cover all of the ice cream.
- **5**-place in a very hot, preheated ovenabout 445 degerees F., gass mark 8 for just three minutes, until golden brown. **S** erve.

Cover and simmer on low heat for one hour. Remove spice bag and fruit. Add cider, stir and heat mixture on medium heat. Serve hot. Makes enough to fill a large punch bowl.








## It's in the Air By: Jamie Rasmussen



Randy spoke not a word, but went straight to his work,


Correcting those worksheets, then turning with a jerk,



The government has decided to reroute Hwy. 55 to make traveling more convenient. The Hwy. would start at 46 St. and would travel to Hwy. 62, a 4 lane highway with shoulders, turn lanes, tunnels, and berms. It would be considered the best way for traveling from the downtown Mpls. area to the Airport and to the Mall Of America. It will be 3.5 minutes faster than the present route.

The land and the homes that they must tear down involves the Minnehaha park and surrounding neighborhood. 40 years ago this land belonged to the Federal Mines. The Government decided to preserve it, hoping that someday they would build a freeway right along the river wall. That day has now come.

The citizens were called together as a group and were given 120 different options. None of the options included the Minnehaha area being destroyed.

Earthfirsters and many other concerned individuals have been fighting to prevent this from happening. They have led and conducted several rallies, sit-ins, hunger strikes and marches but still no positive reaction. The Earthfirsters got involved when they received a call for help from one couple who refused to leave their home. The Earthfirsters set up camp in their front yard. People have been fighting the destruction of Hiawatha for years. Not only have residents' homes been sacrificed but also the sacred sites of the Mendota Mdewakaton Dakota community have

On November 24th Mini-School had a sexual violence speaker come in to talk with students about inappropriate mannerisms of sexual conduct. Suzi Kim defined sexual violence as a weapon used against another to gain power and control. Consent is the same as permission which is what one needs to be given in order to keep from being accused or charged with a sex crime.

Suzi Kim stated a scenario that consisted of a teenage male and female at a party. The male is a high school student who is valued by his community. The female is new to the area and the High school. Quickly, after learning about how special this guy is, she doesn't think to hesitate when he tries to put the moves on her. Instead, she keeps her thoughts to herself and doesn't resist as he has intercourse with her even though she is very uncomfortable. With the scenario in mind a question is then asked to the class. Is the female to blame? Most of the class agreed to her being at total fault, some believed half and half and one person believed she had little fault at all. Not one person chose to believe that she wasn't to blame at all and was innocent. The law sees it that way because even though she didn't say "no" she also didn't say "yes" either. Therefore, he's guilty of sexual violence. It must be remembered that consent can only be given when not under the influence.

Sexual perpetrators are people of all types. Size, shape, color, age, sex have nothing to do with the identity of one. Both sexes are capable of committing a sexually violent act and not necessarily with the opposite sex. Family members

may suffer incest. Even the nicest, clean cut people cannot be excused. Looks can be deceiving. Prostitution is related to sexual violence because rights are violated when one is controlled by another like they are owned.

Statistics prove to be higher for women than men who are violated. However, because of the reputation of men all cases are not accounted for. 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
